"Tuning in" to news about climate change is "more complicated than just turning on the news", writes KLT Correspondent Alison Robey. "There is so much climate misinformation out there, because climate change is complicated and because there are many parties who benefit from us feeling apathetic about it, hopeless about our individual actions making a difference, or angry at each other for believing or not believing in climate change in the first place."

But avoiding climate news "is a big part of why more isn't being done to address it" and by tuning out we each own a bit of the responsibility for this. So where does a doctoral student of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at Yale University turn for climate information that is "true, comprehensive, easy to understand, and relevant – without being biased, misleading, or overwhelming?"

#### KLT receives multi-year grant for climatesmart land stewardship

We are excited to announce our receipt of a generous grant from the Connecticut Land Conservation Council to conduct restoration of early successional habitat in the East Kent Hamlet Nature Preserve! The three-year project involves careful eradication of invasive plant species, introduction of ecotypical native plants grown from seeds harvested from healthy habitats on other KLT preserves, and establishing easy and pleasing ways for visitors to learn about the ongoing transformation.

#### **Collaborating for Community Sustainability**

Over the course of 2024, KLT joined colleagues from eight northwest Connecticut towns who work as advocates for conservation and affordable housing. Our hope was to develop a common understanding or our organizations' goals and priorities, and identify ways we might work together in alignment. Our consensus that healthy communities need both affordable housing and conserved land helped lead to the publication of the Northwest Connecticut Affordable Housing and Conservation Collaboration Strategy, which presents our work and suggests strategies and tools for moving forward together.




